Wednesday, November 11th, 2009

The Samuel Harrison Society participated in the Veteran's Day presentation of the documentary, *A Trumpet at the Walls of Jericho: The Untold Story of Samuel Harrison* hosted by St. John's Congregational Church, Springfield, MA. SHS member Blayne Whitfield introduced the documentary to the audience before it was shown Wednesday evening at 7pm in the church sanctuary. St. John's Congregational Church presented the documentary as part of their 165th Anniversary celebration. The Rev. Samuel Harrison was a former Pastor of St. John's from 1866 to 1870. Out of the Archives

Freedom from Slavery...

According to Samuel Harrison's autobiography, shortly after his birth in 1818 all the slaves of the Bolton family, including Samuel's family, were emancipated by the owner and given the choice to remain in the country or to immigrate to



Africa. In 1816, the American Colonization Society presented a so-called "solution" to the plight of free blacks who had been denied the full rights of citizenship. There were many people who believed that the free blacks would be unable to assimilate into white society. There were also the slave owners and racists who wanted to have the blacks expelled from the country all together. But there were those such as clergy and abolitionists who wanted to assist blacks in attaining their freedom and so offered them an opportunity to return to Africa. In 1820 the first ship of settlers headed for West Africa and the colony of Liberia. [In 1842, Liberia became an independent state.] Samuel's mother Jenny, chose to stay with the Boltons and went north to work with the family in New York City. Samuel Harrison remained in contact with the Bolton family throughout his life.

SHS Says Goodbye to One of Its Beloved Members


